Homeland Security

Specific to Homeland Security and Emergency Response (HS/ER), Ruth McBurney, Ken Evans (IL) and I had the opportunity to brief CRCPD efforts related to emergency preparedness and response with our Advisory Team for the Environment, Food, and Health (A-Team) and the Federal Radiological Monitoring and Assessment Center (FRMAC) partners. **CRCPD also has an opportunity to share state perspectives with the Federal Radiological Preparedness**Coordinating Committee (FRPCC) regarding gaps in radiological preparedness. We will be working with our committees and you as our membership to gather data to inform this initiative.

Health Physics Society, Organization of Agreement States, and International Atomic Energy Agency

I'm happy to say that I was able to attend both the Health Physics Society meeting in July and the Organization of Agreement States (OAS) meeting in August in person. Thank you to both organizations for hosting these events as a hybrid of in-person and virtual attendance and allowing CRCPD to share information about our organization and committee initiatives. We were able to highlight the Source Collection and Threat Reduction Program (SCATR) program with partners during both meetings, and I urge you to continue to talk with your licensees about using the program to dispose of sources they no longer want or need. It was an honor to represent the CRCPD membership on this and many other topics during these meetings and I will continue to strive to share information that reflects CRCPD's initiatives and needs. In mid-September, I will also represent the CRCPD at the International Atomic Energy Agency's General Conference, so please let me know if you have thoughts or information that I can share with this international community.

Success Stories in Radiation Emergency Preparedness

We are happy to announce that we recently released four new Success Stories in Radiation Emergency Preparedness. CDC supports many state and local public health and emergency management jurisdictions in radiation emergency planning and preparedness activities. These best practice videos highlight some of the ways

state and local partners have used CDC training, tools, and other resources.

Many of these videos showcase partners preparing and training volunteers for community reception centers (CRCs). **CRCs are locations designated by emergency response officials to provide screening for radioactive contamination and other services to people who have been affected by a radiation emergency.**

In this release, we highlight the following programs:

- Texas Department of Health discusses how they developed strong regional
 partnerships to build capacity for radiation emergency preparedness and
 response, leveraging resources developed by CDC.
- Public health officials with the El Paso, Texas, Department of Health
 describe how they developed partnerships with other regions in Texas, as well
 as neighboring states and Mexico, to plan for a radiation emergency, including
 exercising response plans for a community reception center.
- The Director of Ventura County, California Health Department discusses
 how his agency's experiences in developing a community awareness
 campaign and planning for a nuclear terrorist incident not only helped
 his community prepare for a radiation emergency, but also can help other
 localities who are trying to do the same.
- Public health officials with the Mississippi State Department of Health
 describe their multi-year effort to increase capacity by building up the tools,
 training, and relationships needed to prepare for and respond to a radiation
 emergency.
