

NARR Update

The National Alliance for Radiation Readiness (NARR) held its annual meeting on May 21, 2019, in Arlington, Virginia. **This meeting was held in conjunction with a NARR/RITN (Radiation Injury Treatment Network) sponsored Cytokine Distribution Workshop (May 22-23, 2019).** Kim Steves (KS), who serves as the Tri-Chair of the NARR

NARR Update

During the NARR Annual meeting, member organizations gave updates on activities occurring within their organization related to radiological emergency preparedness and response in public health. Ruth McBurney presented information on CRCPD activities with a focus on the HS/ER Committees. Ruth's presentation included

information on:

- the new CRCPD task force working to develop population monitoring train-the-trainer workshops;
- the new CRCPD task force which is currently being established to develop guidance radiological respiratory protection for ancillary emergency workers;
- the Radiation Operation Support Specialist (ROSS) program;
- the ongoing assessment of radiochemistry capabilities of the states, and;
- the efforts to enhance public messaging during radiological emergencies.

Ruth also discussed the partnerships and collaborative efforts CRCPD maintains with many public health organizations and agencies.

NARR Update

In addition to member updates, the NARR meeting included a table-top exercise to test the NARR Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) defining the roles and responsibilities of the NARR during a radiological emergency which impacts (or will likely impact) the United States.

NARR faces challenges in the upcoming year as the funding which has historically supported the Alliance, and which has exclusively come from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), has been cut. This funding cut may result in an inability to hold an inperson meeting of the membership during 2020 and may limit the ability for the Executive Committee to meet. The NARR Executive Committee and membership are currently investigating other opportunities for funding for the activities of this Alliance.

The purpose of the cytokine workshop was to review existing drafts of clinical and logistical guidance for cytokine distribution in the event of an improvised nuclear device in the United States. **During the workshop gaps, areas of redundancy, and foreseeable challenges to the guidance were identified.** NARR and the RITN will be working together to finalize cytokine guidance based on the results of this workshop.
